THE COMMUNITIES

The Greater Egg Harbor Regional High School District is comprised of Egg Harbor City, Galloway, Hamilton and Mullica Townships. It is the largest school district, in area, in the state of New Jersey. It also serves students from Green Bank and Port Republic. The district operates three comprehensive high schools: Absegami High School, Cedar Creek High School, and Oakcrest High School. The district has a population of over 72, 000 people and is located in Atlantic County approximately 12 miles west of Atlantic City and a sixty minute drive from Philadelphia. The area is semi-rural with agriculture and light industry.

THE HIGH SCHOOL

Cedar Creek High School opened its doors in September 2010 as the third high school in the GEHRHSD. For the 2018-2019 school year, our student population will be approximately 940 students. Our academic year begins in September and runs through June, and consists of three trimesters. Students will be required to attain 120 credits and satisfy all New Jersey State graduation requirements while maintaining a good attendance record.

GPA DISTRIBUTION

Cedar Creek High School uses a numerical grading scale which ranges from 50 to 100 for the reporting of trimesters and final grades. Numerical grades may be converted to letter grade and/or a 4.0 scale using the chart provided. A student's Unweighted GPA will range from 50-100. Prior to the 2015-2016 school year, an honors course received 5 points and an AP course received 10 points for the weighted average. Beginning with the 2015-2016 school year, A weighted GPA is calculated by adding 10 percent to the final grade of an Honors course and 20 percent to the final grade of an AP course. The weighted GPA is used to determine class rank.

CURRICULUM

Cedar Creek High School students have an eight period rotating drop schedule with 6 periods meeting each day for fifty-eight minutes. A student's program is individualized with emphasis on aptitude, interest, and career goal. There are a variety of electives that meet the student's educational and vocational needs. Courses are available in the following areas: Art, Business, ELL, English, Family and Consumer Sciences, Health and Wellness, Mathematics, Media, Music, Performing Arts, Science, Social Studies, Special Education and World Language. To receive a Cedar Creek High School diploma, the Class of 2018 must pass a NJ State Mandated Assessment, and earn a minimum of 120 credits including: Four years of English; one year of World History/Cultures; two years of United States History; three years of Mathematics; three years of Science; one year of World Languages; one year of Career Education & Consumer, Family, and Life Skills (CFLS) - one semester of Financial Literacy; one year of Visual and Performing Arts (VPA); and one year of Health & Physical Education for each year a student is in attendance at Cedar Creek High School.

Elective offerings for the class of 2018 include:

Visual and Performing Arts: Creative Writing, Computer Aided Design and Drafting 1 and 2, Computer Graphic Applications 1 and 2, Studio Art 1 2D Art and Design, 3D Art and Ceramics, Art Portfolio Development, AP Studio Art, Sculpture, Culinary Arts 1, 2 & 3, Band, Chorus, Instrumental Music, Introduction to Theatre, Play Performance, Introduction to Mass Media, Television Broadcast, Digital Video and Editing, History of Rock & Roll, Dance, Dance Composition, Film Appreciation, Film Production, Introduction to Engineering Design, Digital Electronics, Principles of Engineering, and Engineering Design and Development.

Financial Literacy: Honors Financial Accounting, Business Law and Ethics, Computing For College, Consumer Math, Employment Preparation and Aptitude, Stock Market & Investment, AP Macroeconomics, Management Sales & Hospitality, Small Business Entrepreneurship, Restaurant Management and Hospitality.

Career Education and Consumer, Family, and Life Skills: AP Psychology, Abnormal Psychology, Law and Criminal Justice, History of 20th Century Pop Culture, Conscience of Man, Psychology, AP Statistics, Science Research, Life Skills, School to Careers, Environmental Systems and Sustainability, Introduction to Environmental Studies, Ecological Principles, PLTW Environmental Sustainability. Note: all course listed for Visual Performing Arts and Financial Literacy could also satisfy the Career Education and Consumer, Family, and Life Skills graduation requirement. One course could not satisfy both requirements.

Presently, there are 32 Honors courses and 15 Advanced Placement courses offered: Sophomores who meet the appropriate prerequisite may take two AP classes; seniors and juniors may take 1-5 AP classes each year. Students also have the opportunity to earn Dual Credit from Stockton University, Seton Hall University, Rowan College at Burlington County and Atlantic Cape Community College in a variety of courses subject to change each year.

ACADEMIC COURSE OFFERINGS

ENGLISH

Students take English 1 and American Literature at either the college prep or honors level. They then also have the option for Advanced Placement in their junior and senior years. The English elective available to students is Creative Writing.

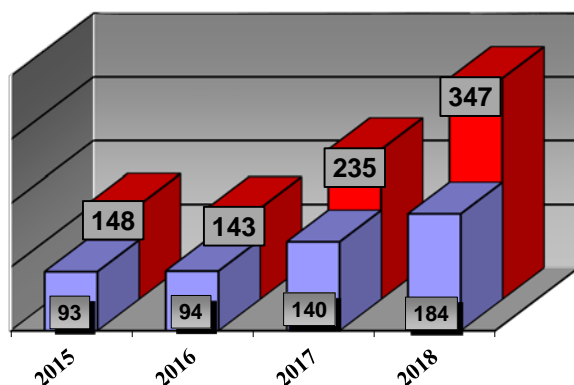

ADVANCED PLACEMENT PROGRAM - DISTRIBUTION OF 2018 AP TEST RESULTS

AP courses are offered in sophomore, junior and senior years. Eligibility requirements include: prerequisite courses, grades, proficiency testing, and/or teacher recommendation. In May 2018, 161 students sat for 347 exams in 18 subject areas (some of which are not offered as AP courses at Cedar Creek); 53% scored 3 or above.
